Summary of key findings for parents

This provision is inadequate

- The provider does not ensure staff are fully aware of the signs and symptoms of child protection and what steps they should follow if they have any concerns regarding children's welfare. This puts children's welfare at risk.
- The provider does not monitor staff well enough to identify areas of weaknesses in their knowledge and understanding.

It has the following strengths

- Children have an enjoyable time at the club, helping to progress their development.
- Staff work in partnership with parents, gathering their views on the activities in the setting. Recent changes have been made to the sports activities on offer, following suggestions by parents, helping to support children's physical development. This provides good continuity of care for the children.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

To meet the requirements of the early years foundation stage and the Childcare Register the provider must:

Inspection findings

Effectiveness of the leadership and management is inadequate

Safeguarding is not effective. Staff do not follow the safeguarding policies and procedures that are in place. The provider does not ensure staff are able to identify when a child may be at risk or that they understand their roles and responsibilities in reporting any concerns to the lead safeguarding officer. The provider does not monitor staff with regards to their knowledge of safeguarding practices and, consequently, is not able to identify clearly what next steps to take and any further coaching and support staff need. This further puts the children's well-being at risk. Once the provider has been made aware of any safeguarding incidents, she works alongside other professionals reporting these concerns to help safeguard children.

Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is good

Staff work closely with teachers in the school to share children's developmental progress. Staff share any assessments they carry out on the children, helping to support good continuity of care for the children. Children thoroughly enjoy learning skills, such as using scissors safely and talking through what they are making. They develop confidence when talking about their work, helping to support their self-esteem. Children enjoy working together using the ride-on toys. They work out how to safely pull the trolley along so the other child does not fall out. The children use problem-solving skills as they wash the resources outside and move in different ways to reach areas to clean. This helps the children's physical development.

Personal development, behaviour and welfare are inadequate

Children's welfare is not assured due to the weaknesses in staff safeguarding knowledge. Staff work with the children to mirror the same behaviour management policies and procedures that the school follows. This helps the children to learn the consequences of their actions. Children behave well.

Superkids Club registered in 2010. It re-registered as a limited company in 2013. It operates from John Ball Primary School in the Blackheath area of the Royal Borough of Greenwich. The club provides wraparound care for children attending the school. The club runs a breakfast club from 7.45am to 9am, a lunch club from 11.45am to 12.45pm, an after-school club from 3.15pm to 6pm and a holiday playscheme from 8am to 6pm. The club employs 15 members of staff, nine of whom hold appropriate early years qualifications.

This inspection was carried out by Ofsted under sections 49 and 50 of the Childcare Act 2006 on the quality and standards of provision that is registered on the Early Years Register. The registered person must ensure that this provision complies with the statutory framework for children's learning, development and care, known as the early years foundation stage.

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
