Summary of key findings

This provision meets requirements

- Leaders and staff at this club are knowledgeable and demonstrate a secure understanding of how to plan a safe and stimulating environment for all children. They talk with ease about how they plan and set up a vast array of activities to support children's individual enjoyments and interests. They are clear that children are given autonomy over their play at the club, listening to children's expressions of interests and enabling these wherever possible.
- All staff understand the importance of building respectful and positive relationships with children, including when they initially start attending the club. This supports children to develop a positive sense of self-belonging.
- Leaders have sufficient arrangements in place to ensure effective communication with the schools that children attend. This promotes a culture of collaborative working to meet the needs of children. Early years children benefit from a consistent key person. This is in place to support children's personal, social and emotional development.
- All staff promote an inclusive service that values and respects a variety of cultures. Leaders have appropriate processes in place to support children with special educational needs and/or disabilities. They discuss the importance of working in partnership with parents and other professionals to give children the tailored support and care they need.
- Staff talk about how they support children to understand appropriate behavioural expectations. This aids children to regulate their own behaviours and supports their understanding of rules and boundaries. Staff explain how they are positive role models, which contributes to children understanding their own and others' emotions.
- Leaders and staff have appropriate systems in place to ensure children's safety. They consider how to effectively ensure children are adequately supervised. Various risk assessments help all staff ensure the premises remain safe and fit for purpose. There are communication methods in place for staff to share relevant information to ensure children's individual needs are met. This supports the smooth running of the club.
- There are effective processes in place to promote an effective, two-way flow of information sharing when considering parental partnership. This ensures a consistency of care between the club and home, and means parents are kept well informed.
- Leaders have arrangements in place to continually reflect and improve the service they provide. They talk about how staff meetings and leadership discussions support continual reflection and help them to evaluate the service they offer and identify any improvements.
- Leaders ensure they and staff understand child protection and their responsibilities to safeguard children and protect their welfare. They have a secure understanding of what may indicate that a child is at risk of harm and know what steps to take to raise concerns without delay.

There were no children in the early years age range present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no early years children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.
